KNOW THE BASICS

All parents/guardians must know your child's bus information including;

- **bus operator name** (company)
- **route number** (3 digits)
- **bus stop location**
- **scheduled pick-up/drop-off times**

This information is provided on your transportation postcard or through logging into the student information section of triboard.ca

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- Have your child arrive at the bus stop **5-10 minutes** before their pick-up time.
- Assume responsibility for your child's behavior while waiting to board the bus.
- Understand that **the bus is viewed as an extension of the classroom** and, as such, student discipline falls under the responsibility of the school Principal.
- Complete and update any medical/life-threatening information for your child (if applicable) and submit this information to their school.

TRAVEL TO THE BUS STOP

AT THE BUS STOP

Never play around when you are at your school bus stop.

When it is winter, do not stand on or play on snowbanks.

If you drop something under the bus do not try to get it back yourself.

Never go under, or reach under the school bus for any reason.

- Parents/Guardians are responsible for their child's safe travel to and from the bus stop and while they wait for the bus
- All kindergarten students must be accompanied to and from the bus stop by an adult, guardian, or another responsible person.
- **You must be 5 to 10 minutes** early arriving to your bus stop. The school bus driver has a lot of students to pick up and can't wait for you if you are late.
- Parents, you should take your child to see their school before the first day. The bus may stop at other schools before or after your child's school.
- It will help your child to know what their school looks like so that they do not miss getting off at the right school. Also teach your child the name of their school so they can tell the bus driver.

Remember

*"we wait for the bus,

BUS CANCELLATION AND DELAYS

A bus may be delayed for various reasons such as railway crossing, traffic conditions, road closures, weather etc. Operators are obligated to post delays of 15 minutes or greater to the Delays & Cancellation section of triboard.ca. **Parents/Guardians should follow these updates regularly and have a number of options to do so:**

- Visit the website and search their bus route number
- Subscribe to email notices about their bus
- Download the Bus Delays App and use code **TSTS**

INCLEMENT WEATHER

The decision to cancel school buses is a shared responsibility between **Tri-Board** and the school bus operators. The process incorporates real-time weather/road condition reports from several spotters throughout the district as well as the most current weather information available.

WEATHER ZONES

Tri-Board is split into ten (10) weather zones. Please refer to your transportation postcard or triboard.ca to determine what zone you live in as well as what zone your school is located in.



FOG

Heavy fog can reduce visibility. If the fog does not clear by noon, the afternoon run will also be cancelled. Schools will be notified by their bus operators and will be responsible for communicating with parents.

SNOW, FREEZING RAIN, EXTREME WEATHER

In the event of inclement weather buses will be cancelled in the morning and the afternoon.

NOTIFICATIONS

All weather decisions are posted at triboard.ca no later than 6:30 am. Parents/Guardians who are subscribed will also receive an email. We do our best to also share weather decisions on Tri-Board's social media.

PARENT/GUARDIAN RESPONSIBILITIES

Safety of our 30,000 riders and their drivers are our main priority. We understand a cancelled/delayed bus may be inconvenient, however we cannot incorporate this into our decision-making.

As long as schools remain open, parents/guardians are welcome to transport their children to school when the bus is not running. In this case, parents/guardians will be responsible for picking up their child at the end of the day. If buses are running and you do not think it the weather or road conditions are safe, you never have to put your child on the bus.

THE DANGER ZONE




The danger zone is an imaginary bubble that shows you the dangerous areas around the school bus. **The danger zone goes 10 steps all the way around the bus.**

The most dangerous areas are in front of the bus and behind the bus because the driver can't see you. The bus tires are also dangerous so make sure to always stay away from them. Never go behind, or directly in front of the school bus.



STUDENTS IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM

Tri-Board has implemented a student I.D. program for students that need to be met by a parent or other responsible person, are required to carry an Epi-Pen, or for those students that must transfer to another bus. These tags are placed around the handgrip on the top of the student's backpack.

RIDING ON THE SCHOOL BUS



Always sit with your back in the seat, facing forward.



Do not snack on the bus.



Do not open the school bus windows without permission from the driver. If your window is open, keep everything, including your arms and head, inside the bus. There are things like telephone poles, trees, cars, and trucks that could hurt you.

BULLY FREE ZONE

We promote school buses as a BULLY FREE ZONE and there is ZERO tolerance. Signs are located inside the bus as a reminder to students. On-going training is provided to drivers to recognize the signs of bullying.

PICKING UP YOUR CHILD

Parents/ Guardians must be 5 to 10 minutes early for pickup at the end of the day. Wait on the side of the road that the bus stops on. Do not stand away from the bus in groups.

When your child is getting off, approach the bus door to receive him or her. This will ensure your child makes visual contact with you, their guardian, or the person responsible for meeting them at the bus stop, before they get off the bus.

Young students and those with purple tags will be returned to the school if a parent/guardian is not present at the stop. Parents/Guardians will need to pick their children up at the school.





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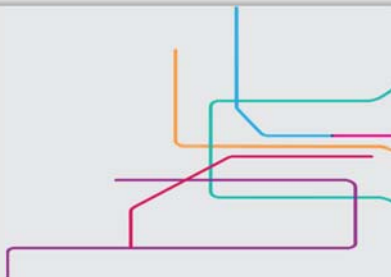
